12. Please provide 3 main advice for those attempting to take the CIA examination

- Don't be lazy in attempting question bank. Be disciplined and don't give up easily. It might be different from others but my way was, one hour or 15 question per day 3 months before the exam.
- Do not memorise, but get your understanding right and be firm on it.
- Always think about why the wrong answer is wrong. It will path your thinking to rationale and it will lead you to checking your text book. This tests your IA principle and whatever question/situation/case study in the question comes your way, you can nail it correctly.
